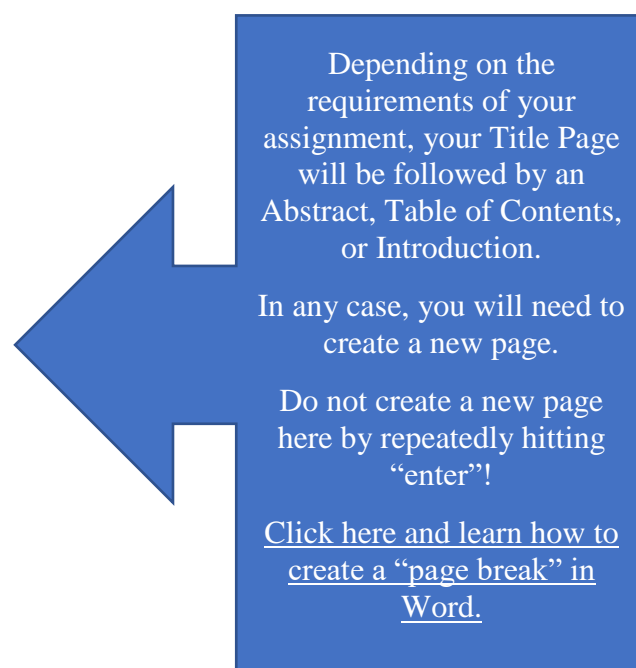

Your Title Goes Here: You Can Add a Subtitle Too

Notice that the title of your essay is a Level 1 Heading. It therefore has capital letters for all words except articles, prepositions and conjunctions. It is also bolded and centered. Here is where you will write your introduction. You may need to add sections and subsections, so will have Levels 2 and 3 headings.

Level 2 Heading


Notice that a Level 2 Heading has capital letters for all words except articles, prepositions and conjunctions. It is also bolded and left-justified. The text under this heading begins in a new paragraph. You may even have to have further levels of subsections.

Level 3 Heading

Notice that a Level 3 Heading has capital letters for all words except articles, prepositions and conjunctions. It is also bold italics and left-justified. The text under this heading will begin in a new paragraph.

Conclusion

Here is where you will begin to write you conclusions. Notice that the Conclusion section requires a Level 2 Heading.



The References page will begin at the top of the next page, following the conclusion. You will need therefore need to create a new page.

Remember, do not create a new page here by repeatedly hitting “enter”!
